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Introduction and Proposal:

This is the perfect model for what an airport can be with the proper land put aside along with a well thought out Layout and Master Plan although this is a rare circumstance that should be the norm. The rent/lease revenue alone is substantial to the airport in this case and the more business that sets up shop within the airport property will bring in more business travelers, especially if those businesses are big, well known corporations, aviation related or not.
